COMPREHENSIVE NEEDS ASSESSMENT

1. Describe the process utilized to conduct the comprehensive needs assessment for your school.

School year 2024-2025 assessment data from the FAST Scores, BSA Scores, Informal Reading, Math and Science Assessments are organized using an online database that contains graphs and tables. The information in the online database is organized to show individual teacher, student, grade level, and school-wide results. Individual student results are given to classroom teachers for their analysis/review. Parents are also a vital part of the comprehensive needs process. A parent survey is sent home each year in March to gather parents input concerning curriculum, environment, and communication from the school/district. Results from this survey are analyzed and used to help write actionable goals and objectives for the following school year. Parents are invited to meet with administration to discuss student achievement results and strategies for improving scores at each School Advisory Council (SAC)/Title 1 Meeting that is conducted monthly. Suggestions are shared and discussed with the staff and considered for inclusion in school-wide plans.

2. Describe strategies that will be used to attract high-quality, highly qualified teachers.

As a school we work collaboratively to retain and recruit Highly Qualified, Certified-in-Field educators. We have a strong support system for our teachers in which instructional coaches and the leadership team provide the necessary professional development needed to ensure each teacher is comfortable with their instruction practice. Our school demographics attracts a culturally diverse staff which makes both students and staff comfortable with the classroom environment. Highly qualified teachers are also attracted and retained with the opportunity to grow in leadership. Retention of teachers is a top priority for our school. Teachers are supported and mentored to grow professionally by a veteran staff of teachers and assigned mentors as an instructional support system. We retain effective teachers through our New Educator, TIER program through district and in-school trainings. Our school also partners with universities to host student teachers in which some turn into new teachers at the school the following school year. We also continually recognize our teachers with incentives for effective teaching practices and supportive practices within the school.

3. Describe how Title I funds are used to staff additional teachers to assist students, particularly low performing students.

Title 1 funds are used to develop a comprehensive professional training program to improve delivery of instruction through a variety of activities that are designed to move teachers to mastery and improve student achievement. We have schedules for push-in support for the lowest 30% of students. We also have resource teachers that provide that double dose of instruction for our lowest 30% students. We utilize our funding to provide Extended Learning Opportunities (ELO) camps for our low performing students. Parental involvement funds are utilized to fund monthly academic parent nights that provide parents with new skills to support student learning at home. Improving the frequency and quality of family participation and increasing family literacy are also goals of our parental involvement component. Money is used to purchase food and supplies/materials.

Title I, Part C- Migrant

Park Lakes has 3 identified migrant students. Collaboration with community agencies will take place to ensure that needed services such as health and nutrition are provided in the event that migrant students enroll. Remediation and tutoring services will be provided as needed.

Students identified as neglected and/or delinquent will be connected to a school social worker through the Student Services Department who will provide support and community resources. Teachers have received the training required for students who report neglect.

Teachers participate in professional development that are linked to improve student achievement in the Florida State Standards and Life Skills and Wellness. The trainings are through CANVAS and Learning Across Broward. Teachers are also required to participate in district mandated Youth Mental Health First Aid training and Science of Reading.

Title III

- 7. (ESOL) Provide a description of services provided to these students.**

All students are being instructed by certified, ESOL endorsed teachers. Our school employs a paraprofessional who works closely with our ELL population. This staff member impacts ELL students by delivering support and intervention programs. This staff member serves as a liaison between the school and ELL community. At our monthly parent nights, staff is present to provide language translations and information to parents in their home language.

Title IX- Homeless

8. Homeless Students. Provide a description of service school level contact, identification process and services provided to these students.

Teachers and staff members are responsible for helping to identify homeless students and referring them to the Homeless Education Program offered by the district. The office staff also refers the students to the Homeless Liaison based on the response on the registration forms. Information is listed in FOCUS. The liaison provides connections to the community to help provide resources for the families living in hotels. For example: hot meals, gas cards, etc. The purpose of the Homeless Education Program is to identify homeless students, remove barriers to their education, including school enrollment, provide them with supplemental academic and counseling case management services, as well as linkages to their school social worker, while maintaining school as the students' stable environment.

9. Supplemental Academic Instruction (SAI)

SAI Funds will be utilized to fund at ELO Camp to assist ELL and struggling students. Funds will also be used to provide additional after school tutoring for struggling students.

10. Violence Prevention

Park Lakes Elementary School implements the County Student Code of Conduct and follows the District Discipline Matrix. Our school enforces the District's Anti-Bullying Policy and has a zero tolerance for bullying and violence. Bullying prevention programs are supported through Counseling/Conflict Mediation programs, guest speakers and student assemblies, Start with Hello, Kindness Program, Life Skills and Wellness, and Character Education.

11. Nutrition Program

Nutritional programs and health education are an integral part of our school, specifically through the Physical Educational curriculum and federal initiatives of the Broward County Public Schools Food & Nutrition Department. The programs are the National Feeding Programs, Snack and Supper Program, Summer Feeding Program.

12. Housing Programs

Referrals are made to the school social worker if parents need housing or food. Additionally, the front office staff takes note of families expressing a need and passes this information on to administration and/or the school counselor.

13. Head Start

14. Adult Education

15. Career and Technical Education

Park Lakes Elementary School has Career Day annually and introduces students to over 50 careers presented by community leaders, teachers, school district personal and parents. The Career Days provide hands on experiences as well as a question, and answer opportunity. Park Lakes will also initiate the Xello Program for Career Development

16. Job Training

The fifth grade students travel to JA Biz Town and the Museum of Science to interact with real scientists and career professionals.

18. Preschool Transition / Middle and High School Orientation(s)

Pre-Kindergarten parents are invited to a Kindergarten roundup to learn about Park Lakes Elementary and the expectations for the upcoming year. Students receive an academic packet and parents can interact and observe in the classroom while the teachers are teaching. Fifth grade parents and students are invited to Magnet Showcases for Broward County to select the school of their choice. Local middle schools present at Park Lakes to inform 5th graders about middle school options and expectations
