

Grade Level Updates: Each grade level representative provided an update.

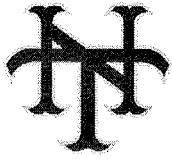

SESIR-School Environment Safety Incident Reporting



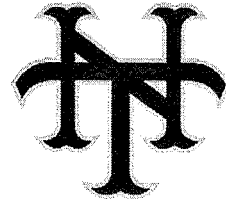
- The School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting (SESIR) System currently collects data on 26 incidents of crime, violence, and disruptive behaviors that occur on school grounds, on school transportation, and at off-campus, school-sponsored events, during any 24-hour period, 365 days per year.

Incidents are reported by schools to the districts which, in turn, provide the data to the DOE. Per F.S. 1002.20, parents of public-school students have a right to access school safety and discipline incidents as reported pursuant to [s. 1006.07\(9\)](#). 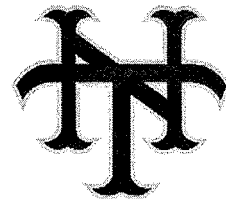

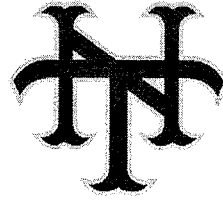

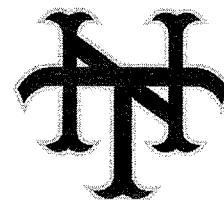

- Dr. Ted Toomer, Central Regional Superintendent
 - PM2 Data Update
 - ELA proficiency increase of 4 percent over last year
 - Math proficiency increase of 2 percent over last year
 - Majority of schools made gains over last year's data.
 - Growth from PM1-PM2 decreased by 1 percent from last year for ELA and remain unchanged for math
 - Most schools have their data. SAF Chairs can request data from Principal
 - Hiring Freeze
 - "Using scapel, not an ax" to fill teaching vacancies
 - "Putting children in front of new people at this point in the year can be tricky."
 - "Children don't learn from people they don't like."
 - Question about security monitors and the hiring freeze. "Hiring freeze is not absolute."
 - Parent question about whether the district is relying on principals requesting replacement teachers to fill vacancies. The District will know when there is a vacancy. Supervisor will communicate with principal about how best to fill vacancies with either on-site staff or someone from the district.

- District level teaching staff who have been identified to fill classroom vacancies will be in schools by Thursday next week.
- Field trips should not be affected by the hiring freeze.
- ESE and related students supports should not be affected by the hiring freeze.
- Hazel Health
 - Hazel Health is not mandatory—it is an optional service for BCPS students
 - If you completed the consent and no longer want your child using the service, you must submit and opt-out
 - Ask if your school has the Hazel Health supplies
- Psychological services
 - DAC was told that there is no backlog of evaluations. Please raise individual concerns to the District level.

New Business:

- Stakeholder Discussion Topics
 - Hiring Freeze
 - Superintendent stated on 1/13/26 that certified teaching staff working at the District level will be deployed to fill classroom vacancies starting the following week.
 - Field Trips should not be cancelled due to hiring freeze!
 - No ESE or IEP services should be reduced or cancelled due to hiring freeze!
 - Graduation Venues
 - Current proposal would allow only the largest 2 schools (Cypress Bay and MSD) to graduate in an off-campus venue. The rest will utilize the school gym.
 - Last 8 year Western, Cypress Bay, and MSD held graduation at Hard Rock
 - Note from Parent: “A single cut off (like enrollment size) to determine ceremony location, creates unequal experiences for student who are achieving the same milestone. It’s an inequitable outcome. Students at schools with more than 550 graduates are provided a more dignified, comfortable, and celebratory environments, while students at smaller schools (through no fault of their own) are placed in a significantly lesser venue. All students are graduating from the same district and meeting the same requirements, yet their experience of this milestone differs dramatically based solely on enrollment size. This is producing unequal outcomes. Graduation is a once-in-a-lifetime event.”
 - Parent notes that the District was just celebrating a historic graduation rate
 - Concern about McFatter graduation held at Pompano Beach High School. McFatter has a 100% graduation rate and is located without the South Florida Education Center. “It bonds us as a community to graduate from meaningful places.”
 - Discussion about how the district could combine graduating classes
 - Concerns about equally celebrating students and the ability of family members to

 - Recess is currently covered by Policy 6830. “Schools shall not use participation or non-participation in physical education or recess (free play) as a way to punish or discipline students.” District staff confirmed recess cannot be used for homework or test prep.
 - PE is currently covered by Policy 4000, but Staff are drafting a new PE policy.

Legislative Update Handout – 2026 Florida Legislative Session
January 15, 2026

Purpose of This Handout

This handout provides a concise overview of the 2026 Florida Legislative Session as it relates to public education and Broward County Public Schools (BCPS). It is intended to support informed discussion, community engagement, and advisory action by CAAC members.

I. Statewide Education Priorities (Florida Legislature & FLDOE)

- A. School Choice & Voucher Accountability
 - 1. Expansion of Florida’s universal voucher system continues.
 - 2. **SB 318** proposes stronger oversight of Scholarship Funding Organizations (SFOs), including:
 - a. Dedicated voucher funding separate from public school funds
 - b. A \$250 million reserve for unexpected enrollment
 - c. Mandatory investigations of fraud and overpayments
 - 3. While framed as accountability, vouchers continue to contribute to declining public school enrollment.
- B. 2. Teacher Recruitment & Retention
 - 1. Florida faces record teacher vacancies.
 - 2. **SB 320** proposes:
 - a. Three-year instructional contracts
 - b. Salary flexibility for advanced degrees
 - c. Expanded Teacher Apprenticeship Program
 - d. Reduced reliance on Value-Added Model (VAM)
 - 3. Governor’s proposed \$30.6B K–12 budget includes:
 - a. \$1.56B for teacher salary increases
 - b. Declining enrollment supplement for districts losing students
- C. Curriculum & Classroom Regulation
 - 1. Bills under consideration include:
 - a. Expanded parental rights over materials
 - b. Restrictions on library books deemed “harmful to minors”
 - c. Classroom cameras at parent request
 - d. Mandated patriotic symbols and oaths
 - 2. Ongoing concerns about academic freedom and local control
- D. Safety & Firearms
 - 1. Proposed expansion of the Guardian Program to universities and additional personnel

II. Broward County Public Schools (BCPS): Local Impact

- A. Financial & Governance Challenges
 - 1. BCPS faces a **\$722 million structural funding gap** for FY 2025–2026.
 - 2. Enrollment declined by more than **10,000 students in one year**.

3. State leaders, including Governor DeSantis, have publicly suggested possible state intervention.
- B. Enrollment, Facilities & School Closures
1. BCPS is considering:
 - a. School consolidations or closures (up to seven schools)
 - b. Boundary changes
 - c. Repurposing underutilized facilities
- C. Graduation Venue Changes (New – January 2026)
1. 34 of 45 high schools will hold graduations in school gymnasiums.
 2. Schools without gyms will use Dillard High School.
 3. 11 schools will remain at NSU.
 4. Cypress Bay HS and Marjory Stoneman Douglas HS will remain at Hard Rock.
 5. Concerns raised about equity, dignity, and transparency in decision-making.
- D. Student & Staff Impacts

 2. Teachers & Staff: - Continued budget uncertainty - Hiring freezes and possible layoffs - Multiyear contracts for some educators, but limited protections overall
